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IMPORTANT HEALTH NOTICE: Our Diocese has directed parishes to **refrain** from the practice of intinction (**dipping the wafer into the wine**). For health reasons please co-operate with this requirement. Receiving the bread only is still regarded as a full expression of the sacrament, or you can simply hold or receive the chalice and then pass it back to the person serving. *Intinction is less hygienic than the common cup.*

Dean Ian writes...

Dear Cathedral people,

I am writing to thank you for all your kindness to Philip and to me as I move towards retirement from my role as Dean of Waiapu.

Firstly, for your most kind gift and the generous lunch provided on my final Sunday recently. The gift voucher from Mitre 10 will be so useful for our renovation project at home which should get under way this month.

I said at the lunch that I didn't want to start thanking people by name as I would be sure to forget to include so many significant people, and that would be most unfortunate. But I shall attempt it here because I owe the Cathedral a lot!

I'm grateful to Bishop Andrew and the nominators who looked beyond any potential controversy and offered me the amazing opportunity to serve as Dean. I think you know I believe sincerely that I was called to the role and have tried to be faithful to that calling since I began in 2017. Despite the burden of my health issues it is my hope that I have accomplished most of what I came to do.

I have appreciated the support and wisdom of the three parish wardens I have worked with and confided in: Graeme, Alison and Kerryn. Your deep knowledge of the parish and care for me will remain in my memory and affections.

I think I can say that the quality of worship has been revitalised and that would not have happened without the dedication and vision of our Director of Music, Anthony, and the commitment of the Cathedral Choir, and more recently, the Strings. Over these years not only have I learned pretty much everything I now know about Cathedral Music and its particular role in adorning our worship, but I have also had the opportunity to create liturgy which brings all of these gifts together. In this way we have been able to do justice to being the Cathedral of the Diocese as well as the parish church.

Recently I was surprised to learn from Dean Anne Mills (Holy Trinity Cathedral, Auckland) that they have to manage a very large workload of regular services with just two stipended clergy, and no retired priests at all (due to the cost of living in Auckland). I want to express my appreciation for everything offered by Dorothy, Erice and Howard, and until recently Bishop Murray and John Williams, Margaret Thompson and not to forget the very significant contribution of the late Graeme Pilgrim, who quietly contributed many hours of ministry.

Thank you to those who have served on Vestry during my term.

Together we were able to achieve the re-location of the Choir, the sale and replacement of the Deanery, and (thanks to the Fundraising Committee) a successful parish fair. We also managed our way through the complexities of decision-making around our response to COVID-19, which disrupted Cathedral life for months. I want to acknowledge the challenges that are to come when the Summary report of Seismic Strengthening becomes available, and the question of the future use and purpose of the Ormond Chapel. Appreciation to our Treasurer, Paul Anderson, who despite a very busy life has provided us with clear information about our finances.

Margaret Thompson stayed in the role of Administrator for a year so that I could become familiar with the work of the Cathedral, and then we were most fortunate to secure the services of Amy Fleming for this complex and demanding role. I am grateful for Amy's initiative and commitment. Our working relationship has been a pleasure.

Thank you to all who commit themselves to rostered ministries and other areas of ministry such as pastoral care and ministry with children. It is simply not possible to have a functional organization without committed members to populate all the roles, so whether your contribution is upfront or undertaken with little fanfare, sincere thanks to you. And thanks to those who have served in these ways but who have now retired.

My final thanks must go to everyone who eased my journey through surgery and radiotherapy: to Bishop and Diocese for the arrangements and practical support during those months, all the extra work for our volunteers (clergy in particular) and the boon of accommodation freely offered to us (and occasionally, the dog) by Jonathan and Kathryn in Palmerston North. Both of us were very grateful for Peter & Mirabel providing Bruno with a home-away-from-home for most of our time attending radiotherapy.

I have appreciated all the sharing of my own journey particularly by those who have told me their own stories of cancer and surgery, and those whose faith on that journey has been such an inspiration.

Now that I have formally laid down my role and relationship with you all I am clear in my own mind that the Cathedral is now ready for a new stage in its life and story, with new leadership suited to the challenges that the future will certainly bring. To that end I commit myself to pray for you all.

I invite your prayers for me as Philip and I seek to discern the work, rest and ministry that yet lie ahead.
