As we move into a new year the small committee will continue to offer visits and help, as we connect frequently by phone and meet quarterly to share concerns as well as other needs.

Pastoral Care is about reaching out and touching people in some ways, perhaps just a quiet chat, a quick embrace, a helping hand, a time to pray and to let those who feel isolated they are not alone.

Recently I have changed from holding an Associate Priest licence to a Permission to Officiate. This allows me to be a little more flexible with what I need to attend, eg Synod, however it will not change my commitment to offering ministry.

I will continue to offer my support to those who do so much and at the same time to welcome others who may wish to join this small and dedicated group.
