shout in triumph to the God of Jacob.

open wide your mouth and I shall fill it.
11. 'But my people would not hear my voice:
and Israel would not obey me.

12. 'So I left them in their stubbornness of heart:
to follow their own devices.

and turn my hand against their adversaries.

A thought from today's sermon:

Jesus is talking about hospitality. The word translated 'hospitality' means literally, 'love of a stranger.' So, hospitality isn't about spending time with people we're comfortable with – but with the stranger – welcoming into our midst those beyond our group, especially those left out by others. I wonder what that might say to us as a faith community – what it may say about our priorities. As English theologian and Archbishop of Canterbury William Temple remarked, 'The Church exists primarily for the sake of those who are still outside it.'
